SEI Alumni Spearheads Her Own Dream: The Story of Growing Up and Giving Back

One of the goals of Self Enhancement, Inc. is to take inner-city youth and encourage them to grow into positive, contributing citizens pursuing their own dream.

Well, Emerald Armstrong-Mitchell, a junior at Fisk University and SEI student since 2nd grade, is doing just that. With Tony Hopson as her inspiration, Emerald has started her own non-profit, afterschool program in Nashville, Tennessee, called "Moves & Grooves." Working with local at-risk kids, Emerald's program hopes to strengthen students' academic skills and introduce them to the performing arts.

Emerald frequently calls Mr. Hopson to get direction and encouragement.

"I can't tell you what it means to me to be on the phone with one of my own students and walk them through the process of presenting a funding proposal for their own non-profit," says Mr. Hopson. "What Emerald is doing is exactly what I envisioned when I started SEI; kids growing up and giving back. I'm extremely proud of her".

Here is Emerald, in her own words...

Without a doubt, SEI is my inspiration. People like, Mr. Spears, Mr. Adams, Mr. Allen, Mr. Bell, Mrs. Hickok, Mrs. Wells, my big brother Troy Hollis, and so many other staff who guided me every step of the way. They are individuals that I can sincerely say have made an impact on my life.

I wanted to give these kids the same opportunity that SEI had given me, a chance to succeed. Currently, my organization, Moves and Grooves, Inc. (the MAG Enrichment program) has completed our first 6-week summer camp. With limited funds, we were able to service 15 students ages 7-15, and grew a waiting list of over 45 children. On April 28, 2003 the organization was recognized in the local Tennessean

newspaper, and has since received funds from Wal-Mart, various banks and private foundations.

Our recent challenge was trying to get into the Nashville Metro School system to expand our services in-school, similar to SEI. On September 4, 2003 we received approval by two Metro school principals to operate our program at two Elementary Schools. We are currently awaiting approval from the Metro Board of Education to begin on January 5, 2004. During this waiting period, we are operating in one elementary school and one middle school.

This year has definitely been one of hard work, and sacrifice. I will be graduating in Spring 2004 from Fisk University, and will continue this project full-time. I thank Tony Hopson for giving me the blueprint to follow, and Gerald Deloney for the pencil and paper to get it done. I know that I am in it, to win it. Although I've been rejected many times, I still will not give up. Just like my SEI summer coaches always said, "it's for the kids."

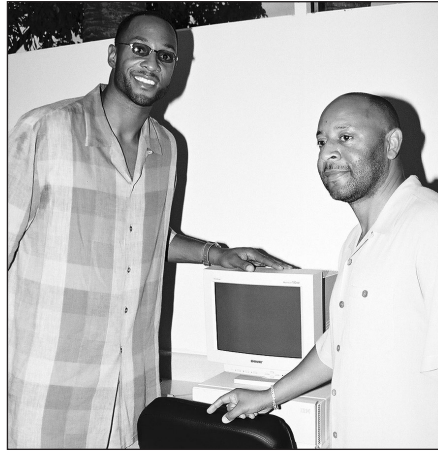
Gerald Deloney Reports from Miami:

Expansion Phase One

As SEI has gained recognition nationwide for setting the bar high for other inner city education centers, discussions have circled around expansion into other cities. SEI is being viewed as a model for numerous programs and is consulting in some of the country's toughest cities.

The Overtown Youth Center, Inc., in Florida, is attempting to bring SEI-style services to Miami's poorest neighborhood (Overtown). The Overtown Community is one that is truly challenged educationally and economically. 1 in 14 children graduate from high school and the community's median income is slightly less than \$10,000.

The Overtown Youth Center Program, based on the SEI-program model, represents an investment in the future of the area's youth. SEI has been involved in the development of the Overtown Youth Center for nearly two

years. While Tony Hopson, SEI President has been involved in helping the founders of the Overtown Youth Center understand the SEI vision and work toward accomplishing that vision, it has been Gerald Deloney, SEI's

Special Projects Manager, who has taken on the responsibility for the day to day operations of the Overtown Youth Center.

"This has certainly been an experience to remember," are Gerald's exact words, when asked about the youth center. "The one thing that I have found is that children are the same all over the country. They have the same wants, hopes, dreams and desires as children everywhere."

When asked about the program's future, Gerald answers, "I am confident that the SEI Program model will work in Miami, as well as it works in Portland, if the people in Miami are patient and stay the course."

Other cities that have initiated work with SEI are St. Louis, Atlanta, and Vancouver, Washington.

Charter School Approval

Middle school opens in Fall 2004

On February 24, 2003 the Portland Public School Board approved SEI's application to open the Center for Self Enhancement Middle School, a charter school, in the fall of 2004. The Center for Self Enhancement Middle School will be open to students in grades 6-8 and will be located at the Center for Self Enhancement.



Many of the elements needed to start a successful charter school are in place at SEI, including: a strong organizational infrastructure; a high level of community support; a documented ability to achieve positive academic and behavioral outcomes; and an excellent facility. The Center for Self Enhancement is a large, 62,000 square-foot facility with six avail-

able classrooms, a cafeteria, library, computer lab, 300-seat auditorium, gymnasium, and other quality resources.

This spring, SEI received a generous grant from the Challenge Foundation, based in Texas, to visit model charter schools across the country, develop the school's educational program and to support staff planning time. In early October a team of SEI staff visited KIPP Academy Houston and YES College Prep in Houston, Texas. Both schools are seen as national models in the charter school movement. The school visits helped to solidify SEI's plans for its own school and underscored the importance of good teachers and good leadership. As Michael Feinberg, founder of the KIPP Academies shared, "people make the difference." Additional site visits are planned for Los Angeles and San Francisco this fall.

The mission of the charter school is to transfer SEI's successful model of working with inner-city youth after-school and on the weekends, to a rigorous academic program during the school day. SEI believes that every student can learn and be successful. The Center for Self Enhancement Middle School will help participating stu-

dents learn that life has options, apply the SEI standards of integrity and respect in their daily lives, and achieve success in the classroom and the community.

The New Juvenile Justice Program

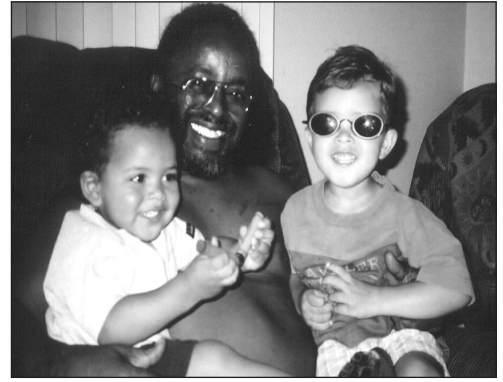
The Family Services Department is now providing case management support services to the Department of Community Justice for Multnomah County. This program serves juveniles on probation or parole and has special competency in serving gang affected youth.

SEI has contracted with four case managers/mentors. This new program follows a national community-based model. This innovative approach brings together the youth's community - family, teachers, mentors, and indigenous neighborhood

case workers - to develop new lines of communication and intervention. The Multi-Disciplinary Team Manager, Michael Ware, says, "Having the parents at the table during the weekly meetings is a crucial part of the treatment. The family can vocalize what the issues are as they see them...as equal partners at the table."

As one would imagine, it is challenging to bring families together for these meetings. To provide all assistance possible, SEI staff will transport family members for the meetings if needed.

100% Graduation Rate Celebrated

The 2003 graduating class is the largest and most successful in SEI's history. Out of 47 members in the class, 46 graduated in June from area high schools including Jefferson, Roosevelt, Benson, and Grant. Of the 21 students who began SEI's program as freshman, 100% graduated and most are on their way to college.

These outstanding statistics are a true testament to the success of SEI's comprehensive youth programs. SEI students at Jefferson High School graduate, on average, at twice the rate of other students attending Jefferson.

"What makes me so proud of being the coordinator of the class of 2003 is that I knew the barriers and struggles they each had to face and overcome daily," said Troy Hollis, SEI Coordinator for Jefferson. "There were many stories of great accomplishments behind their smiling faces as they walked across the stage at graduation. Their dedication and commitment is what makes this class so special."

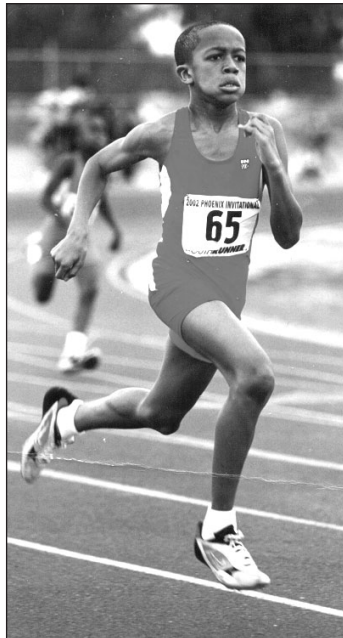

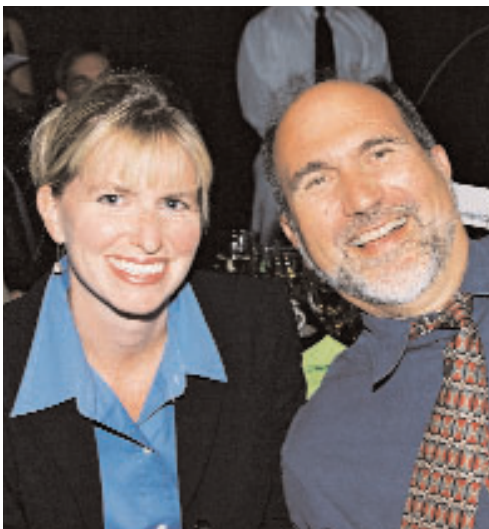
Dear Friends,

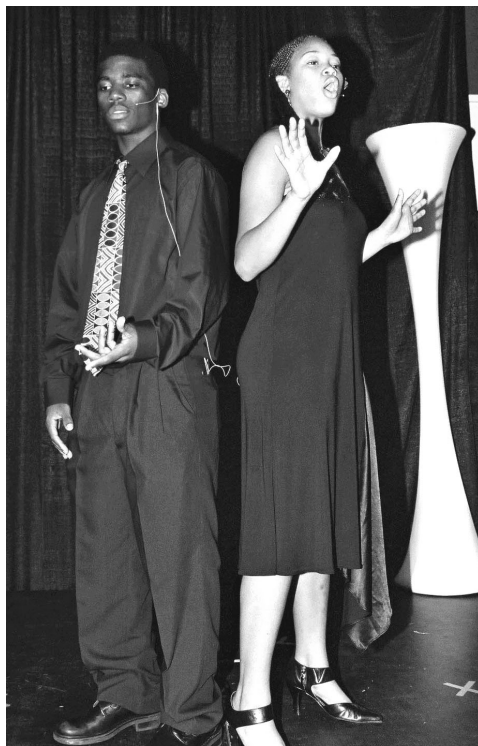

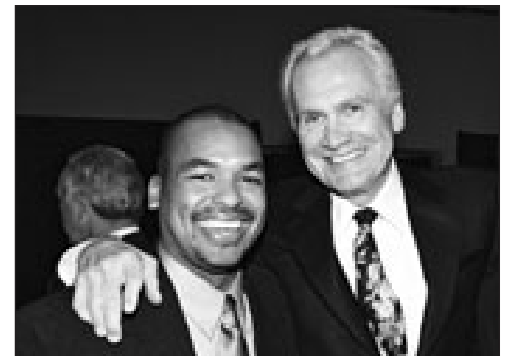
The SEI "Life Has Options" Award was presented to Maribeth Collins, acknowledging

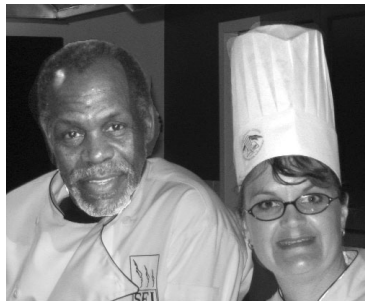
